Welcome to the Newsletter of the research project RESPOND.

The aim of the project, which is funded by the German Ministry for Education and Research (BMBF), is to improve the evidence base for refugee health service provision in Germany. The project covers five years (2016-2021) and nine work packages, in which we investigate important research questions using qualitative, quantitative and routine data sources.

In this issue of the newsletter, we present our research on healthcare structures in German reception centres. As there are no nationwide standards for the organization of primary care facilities in reception centres, there are major differences between and within the federal states with regard to securing the healthcare of asylum seekers. We have summarized preliminary findings from the RESPOND study and evidence from national and international studies in a first working paper on this topic. The aim of this paper is to encourage further discussion on this topic, for example at an interactive workshop with key decision-makers which we will be hosting in May. Health care structures in reception centers

As a result of the temporarily high numbers of refugees entering Germany, the number of reception centers has increased in the last few years. In many of these facilities, outpatient clinics have been set up on site to directly meet the health needs of residents. To date, there is a lack of nationwide standards and guidance for setting up appropriate outpatient clinics, so that local solutions have been employed when it comes to securing the health care needs of residents. The present working paper summarizes findings on outpatient care structures, identifies barriers and promotion factors in health care and presents 15 recommendations for needs-based, efficient and effective care in reception centers.

The WHO report provides a case study overview of good care practices in the context of refugee migration in European countries.
