The aim of the project, which is funded by the German Ministry for Education and Research (BMBF), is to improve the evidence base for refugee health service provision in Germany. In the first phase of the project, we investigated important research questions using qualitative, quantitative and routine data sources. Based on this, we identified possible interventions to overcome barriers to care in the health care of refugees in a tailoring process. In the second study phase, which ends in October 2022, we will further test selected interventions and evaluate existing low-threshold approaches.

In this issue of the newsletter, we would like to inform you about selected interventions and provide a brief overview of our activities in the past year.

Intervention approaches to improve health care for refugees

The results of the needs assessment within the RESPOND project show a need for change and potential for improvement in various areas. In the remaining project period, we will mainly focus on three aspects:

- 1. models of outreach and migration-sensitive health education and information.** We are currently conducting a nationwide survey among project leaders on the most important features of approaches in this area in terms of content and structure.
- 2. Non-physician health professionals in the health care of refugees.** Internationally, there are positive experiences with so-called Refugee Health Nurses. Comparable non-physician care approaches also exist to some extent in Germany, but scientific evidence is still lacking. We are working on a first comparative case study on these models of care in Germany.
- 3. improving the data basis for local care planning.** Based on the quantitative survey in RESPOND and other data sources, an interactive online tool (RESPOND-INTENT) was developed. The tool provides an estimation of general health needs, psychosocial needs, and the frequency of cardiovascular diseases among refugees at a district level in the federal state of Baden-Württemberg. The data are weighted by age, gender and region of origin. The RESPOND-INTENT intervention was piloted in a qualitative interview and usability study. Important insights can now be incorporated in the revision of the online tool as well as in future scientific communication with decision-makers.



The RESPOND project in 2021

In 2021, we were once again able to share and discuss our research results with the public. The close cooperation with many different actors is particularly important for us and always very rewarding.

On 23 March 2021, we held a virtual conference with over 120 participants, allowing us to present and discuss many of our findings from the RESPOND project. In November, we participated in the fourth Community Health Conference at the 'Hochschule für Gesundheit' in Bochum with a session on "Refugee Health".

Moreover, we have published the results of our various research activities in the following publications:

A paper by Amir Mohsenpour, Louise Biddle, Katja Krug and Kayvan Bozorgmehr describes the possibility of measuring the living environment using a multidimensional assessment index and its validation in a shared accommodation for refugees.
